


Goal


Touch Communication

Promoting Socialization Ideation

The sensory blanket would be lined with different sensory objects and by wrapping two or more people and leaning on eachother, the children will feel different textures and also associate sensory pleasure with human contact.

These re-usable sensory stickers can be exchanged with peers and kept in a box to trade and promote socialization with other children. This box can also be given to children without autism to socialize with the autistic children.

The sensory sleeves can be tucked under sweaters or jackets and under uncomrtable situations, the child can touch the sensory sleeves in order to calm down.

No specific toy that any group of students all enjoyed.


Very little socialization.

Very specific teaching based on a reward system. (Pleasure)









These Drawings were done to show how the touch could be utilized and other details were shown.

These were quick drawings done to flush out ideas of how the shirt would be designed.








Touch Ideation

These studies were done to show possible areas of different textiles and pockets.





Conceptual Future TOUCH


As the child grows and becomes more accustomed to the clothing, Touch also matures into clothes that is accepted more in society.
